## WELCOME

Welcome to the 2025 Turkey River Safari! From Memorial Day to Labor Day, this is a summer-long adventure that will take you and your family to new and favorite places along the Turkey River Corridor. The Turkey River Recreational Corridor is a joint effort between Fayette and Clayton counties and the communities of Clermont, Elgin, Elkader, and Motor Mill Historic Site. As one of Iowa's Great Places, the Turkey River Recreational Corridor is working to create great outdoor adventures throughout the Turkey River Valley.

## Site information

Gouldsburg Park  
18649 Sunset Road, Hawkeye


Located 5 miles north of Hawkeye on Sunset Road.

Gouldsburg Park marks the start of the Turkey River Water Trail. The park consists of 64 acres at the confluence of the Little Turkey River and Crane Creek. These streams provide great fishing and canoeing. The hilly area includes great picnic sites and a modern campground with a dump station, showers, flush toilets, and 26 electrical hook-up sites. Enjoy the playground and the hiking trails as you search for the rubbing post.

## How to Make a Rubbing

1. Find the correct page in your guidebook.
2. Place the designated area of the corresponding page over the symbol.
3. Rub the side of the crayon slowly over the paper and watch the symbol take form!

## Tips for Enriching Your Experience:

- Talk to the locals! If you are visiting a site for the first time, explore your community and speak to a trusted adult who works at the site! Some key people to meet may include a park ranger, tour guide, historian, or city staff person.
- Be prepared—always! Keep your guidebook and map with you in your car or backpack all summer long; an adventure is always around the corner! Be sure you don't end up on any level B or C roads!
- Remember: It's summer! We want you and your family to be safe this summer! Remember to wear sunscreen and sun-resistant clothing, bring plenty of water and snacks, and don't forget your camera, first-aid kit, and insect repellent!
- Be a good steward! We care about all living things and want to protect the land, animals, and fellow human beings so that future generations will have wild and precious places to explore!



Things to Do At Each Site

Here are some extra activities you and your family can enjoy practically anywhere!

- 1. Check ahead of time and see if there is a class or activity happening. Many of the sites have terrific websites to let you know what is offered!
- 2. The limestone bluffs that surround the Turkey River Valley are a great place to look for fossils and interesting rocks. Start a collection of your own!
- 3. Visit your local farmer’s market before your adventure and pack a picnic!
- 4. Bring your fishing pole and catch your supper!
- 5. Bald eagles and many other native birds can be seen all along the Turkey River. Start a journal to record all that you see during your safari adventure!
- 6. Go to your local library to find out the history and stories surrounding Clayton and Fayette Counties.

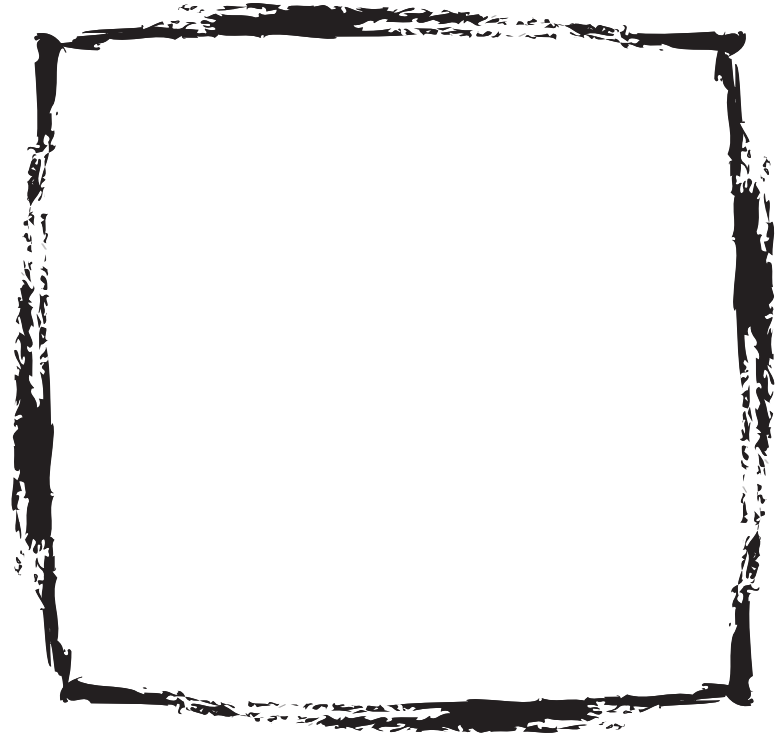

## Clayton County Office Building

It's the perfect place to kick off your Turkey River Safari adventure—don't forget to grab a selfie in front of the building to mark the start of your journey!

Inside, you'll find friendly faces ready to share information about the county. For families, it's a great spot to learn more about how the county is run and where big decisions are made by the local leaders. This is where the Board of Supervisors meets to discuss important issues that affect the community. Who knows—maybe a future county supervisor is in your family!

## Earthmoving Legacy Center

Big machines, big fun! The Earthmoving Legacy Center is a massive museum filled with vintage bulldozers, tractors, and construction equipment that helped shape Iowa's landscape. Kids will love seeing the huge machines up close, and adults will enjoy learning how they built roads, farms, and towns. The museum also shows how earthmoving changed farming and road building in Iowa.

This September, don't miss the 100 Years of CAT celebration! It's a special event marking a century of powerful machines that helped transform our world. There will be exciting exhibits and hands-on activities for the whole family to enjoy!

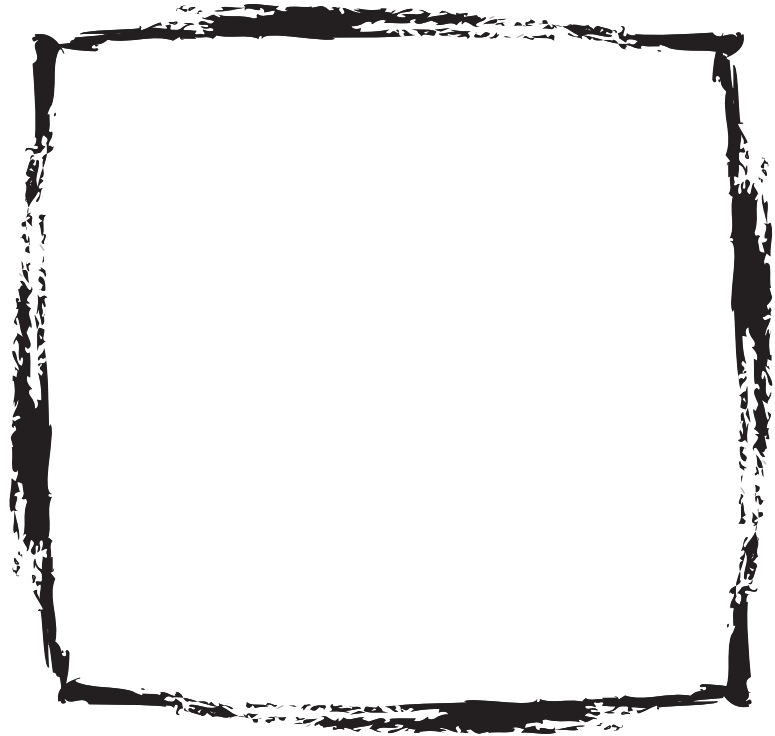

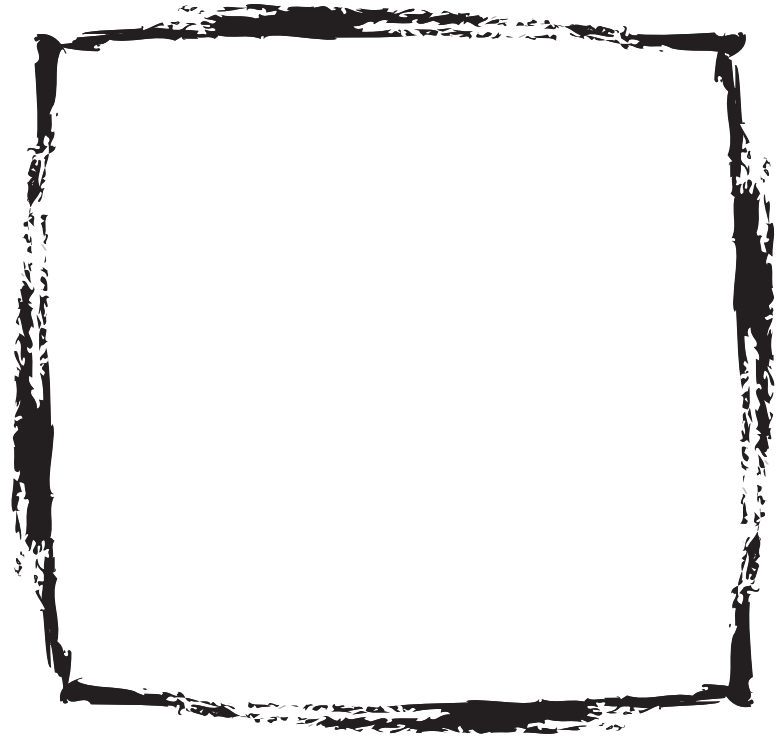
## George Maier Rural Heritage Center

Step back in time and explore what life was like on an Iowa farm more than 100 years ago! This museum is full of old-timey treasures—from farming tools to musical instruments and even an old-fashioned kitchen. Kids can imagine living without electricity or microwaves, while grandparents can share stories of how things used to be. It's like walking through a time machine—right in Elkader!

There are rooms full of artifacts to spark conversations across generations. Imagine attending school with chalk and slates, or working in the fields with hand-powered tools. You'll also find displays about early transportation, home life, and even entertainment from the early 1900s. The center makes it fun for families to talk, laugh, and learn together while exploring a different era. Seasonal exhibits and local artifacts bring history to life in a way that's educational, interactive, and fun for all ages.

While you're in Elkader, be sure to check out the Clayton County Museum Crawl!

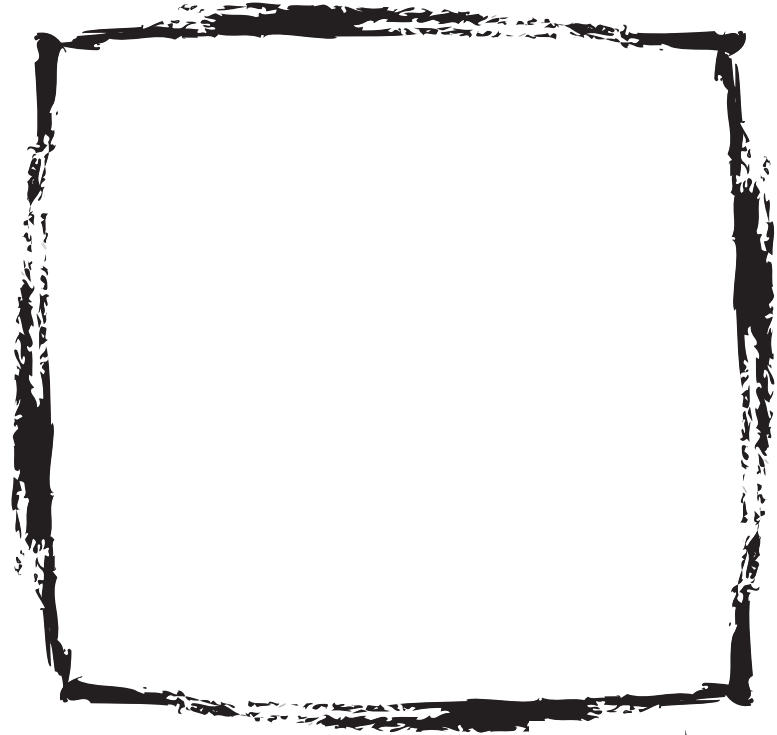


## Elkader City Park

Elkader City Park is a great place to run, play, and relax. It has a cool playground, lots of shade trees, and picnic tables perfect for lunch or a snack break. You can watch the Turkey River flow by, or walk a short path to the Pony Hollow Trail. The open green space is perfect for playing catch, flying a kite, or laying down a blanket for story time. Parents and grandparents will enjoy the peaceful setting and easy access to other attractions in Elkader. It's a great place to recharge and enjoy some outdoor time before your next Safari stop. With restrooms, water fountains, and plenty of benches, this park checks all the boxes for a family-friendly adventure. There's even a community pool nearby for a refreshing splash on warm days, and plenty of space to just breathe in the fresh Iowa air.

The park is also home to the new Farmers Market location, where you can find fresh local produce and handmade goods. Be sure to check out the recently rehabilitated Floral Hall, which hosts seasonal events and is a beautiful spot to explore. During the holidays, Elkader's Light Up the Night event brings the park to life with dazzling lights and festive cheer—perfect for creating family memories!

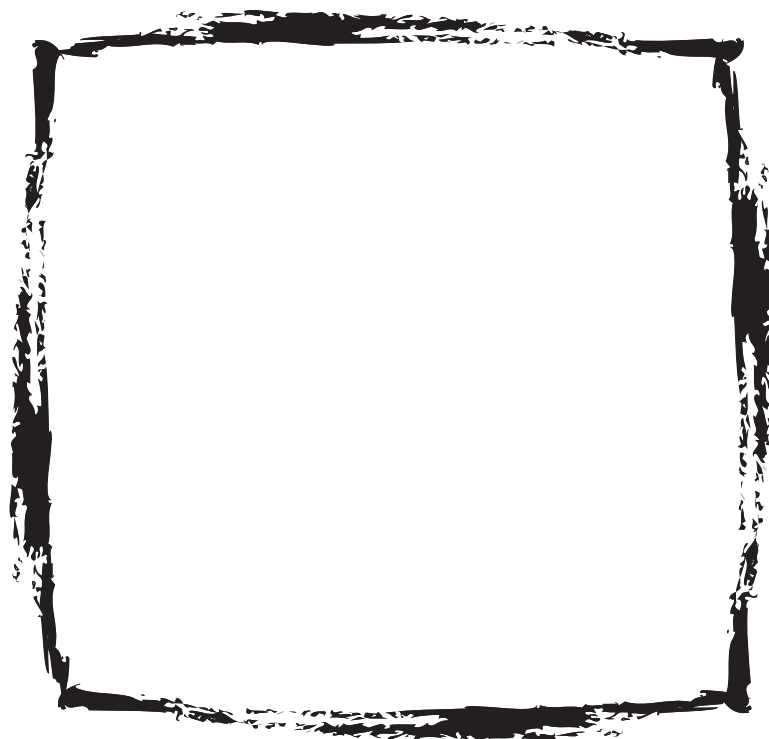


## Pony Hollow Trail

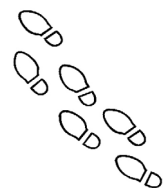

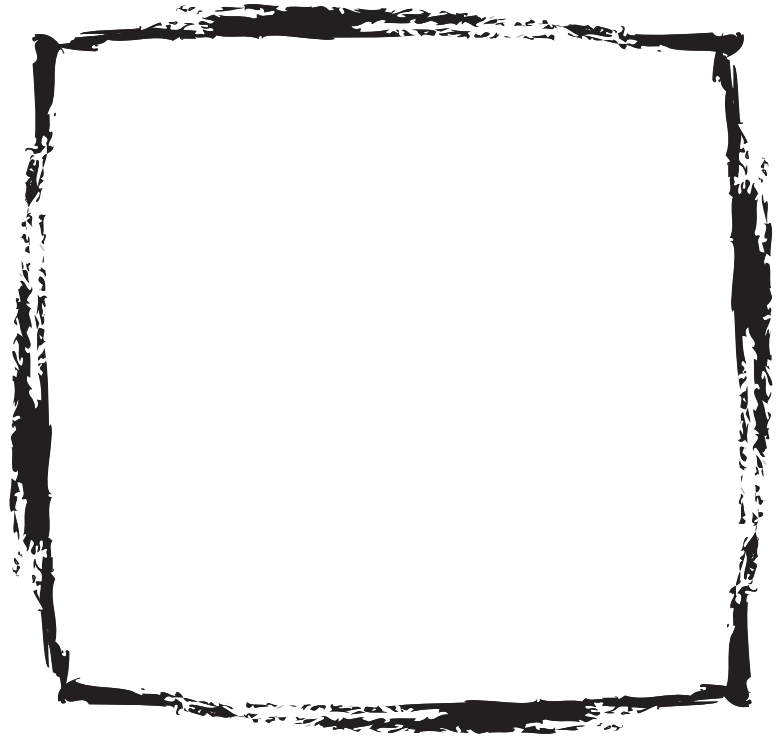
## Founders' Park

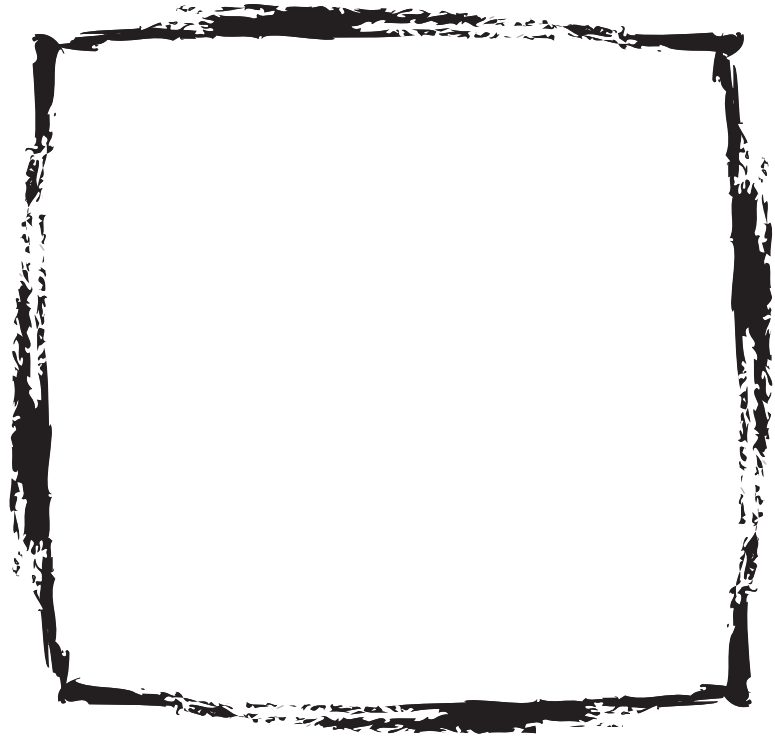
## Motor Mill Historic Site

28515 Galaxy Road, Elkader

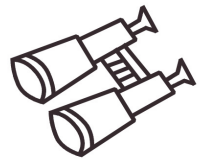

This towering mill stands right next to the Turkey River and once ground wheat into flour for local communities. Now it's a historical treasure that shows off Iowa's early industry and ingenuity. Families can take a guided tour to learn how the mill worked and explore the impressive stone buildings nearby. There's also a scenic trail nearby for hiking or just wandering through nature. Don't forget to bring your camera—Motor Mill is one of the most photogenic spots on the Turkey River Safari!

Guided tours of historic Motor Mill are offered Noon-5:00 PM every weekend Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day.



**CLUE:** Check out the campground! It is East of the Mill itself—look for a wooden kiosk.

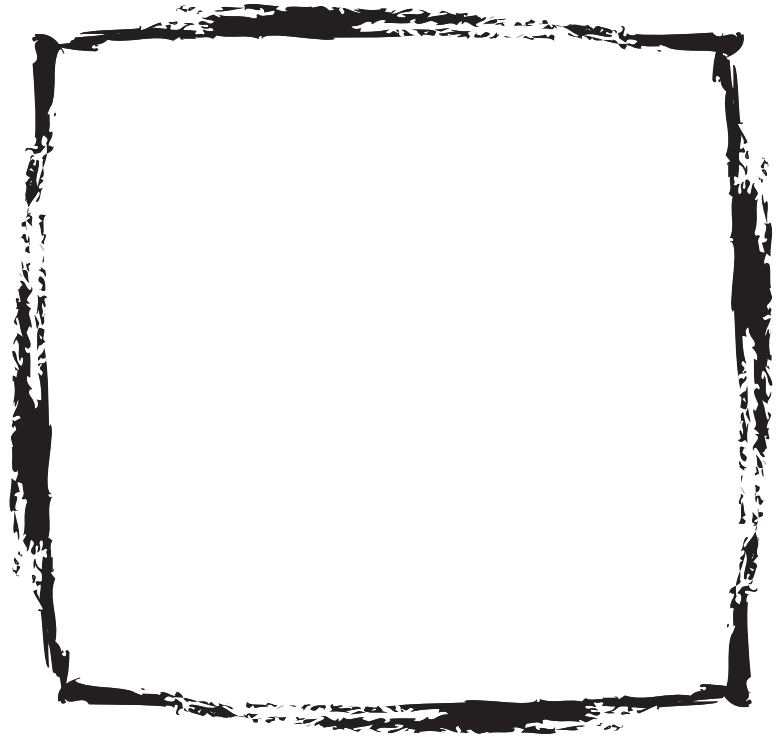


## Osborne Disc Golf Course

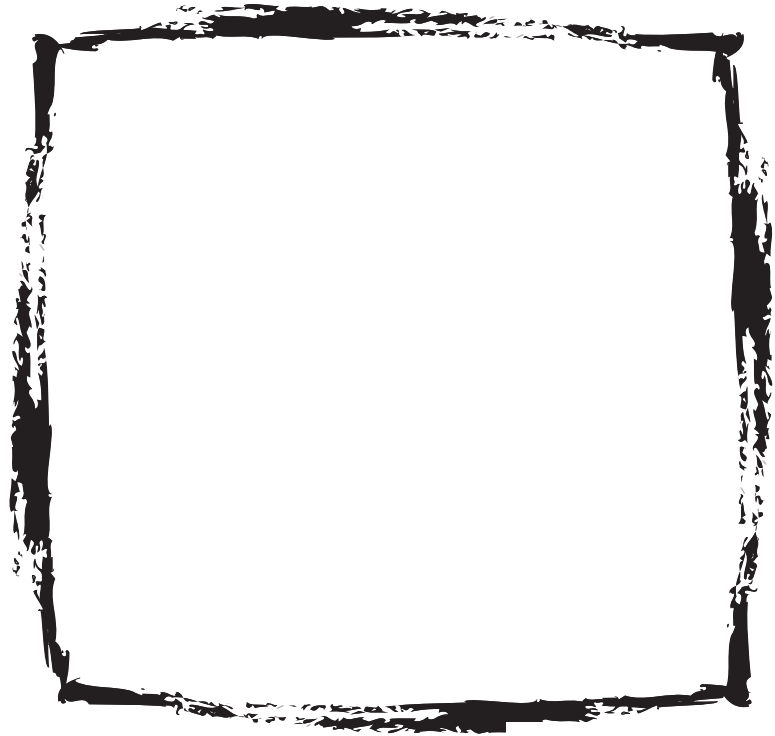


## Osborne Campground

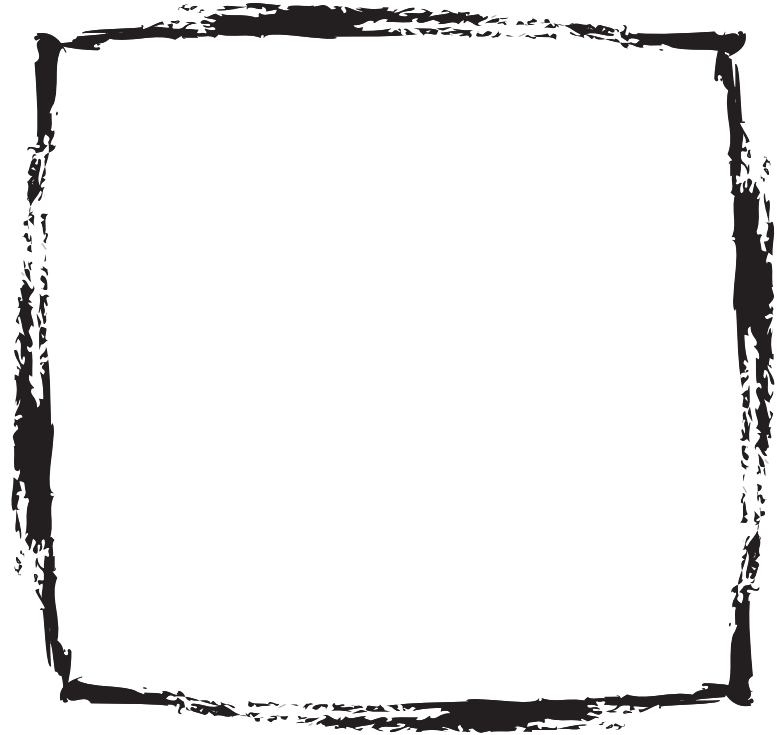
## Volga City Park

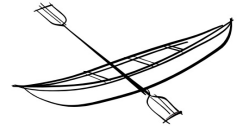

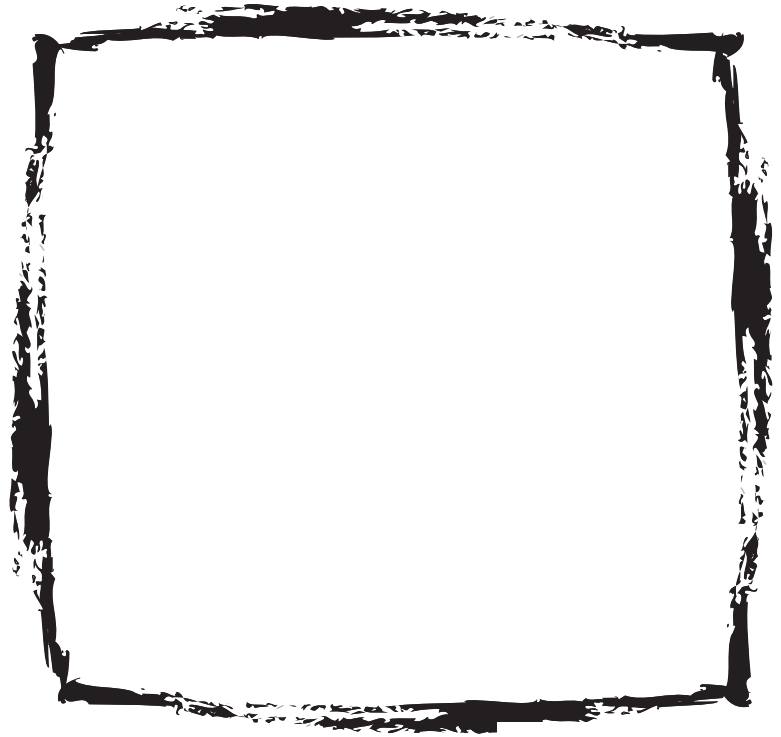
## Echo Valley State Park

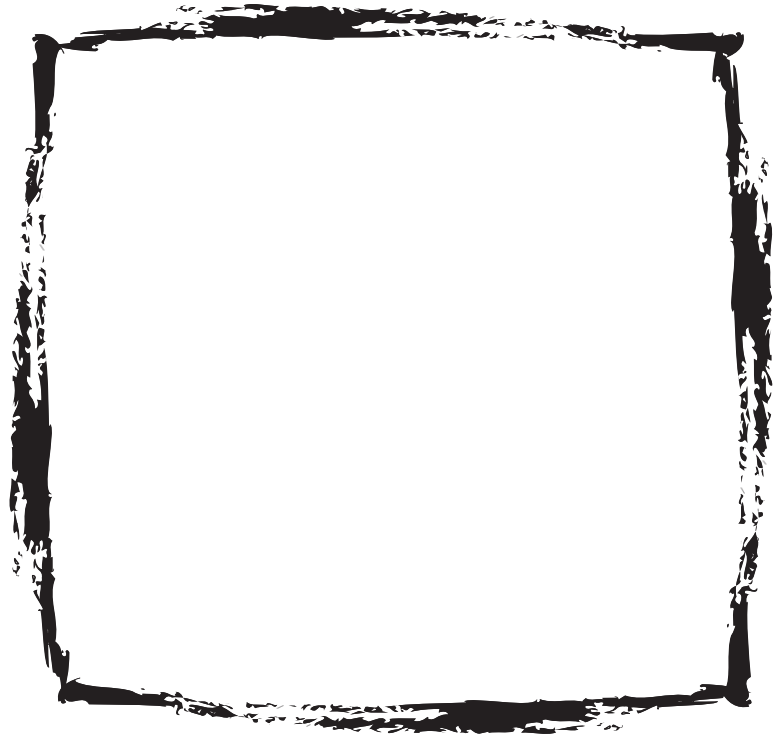
## Gouldsburg Park

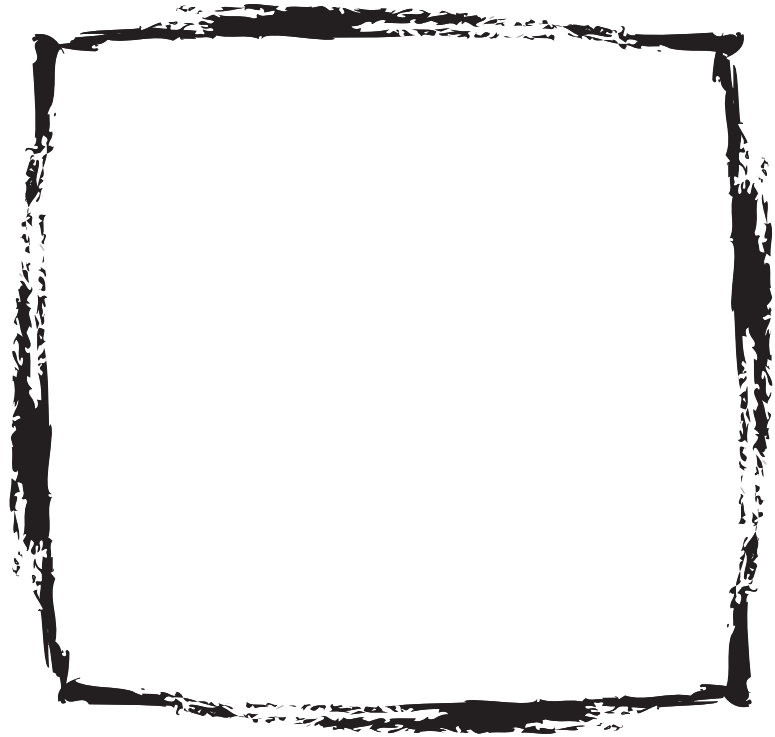


## Dutton's Cave

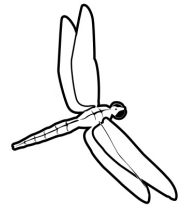

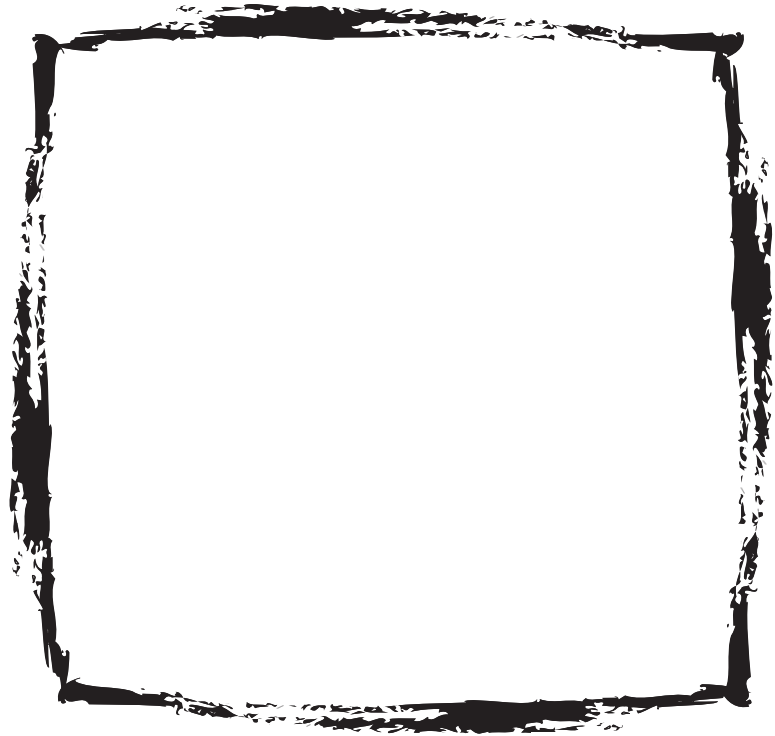
## Goeken County Park

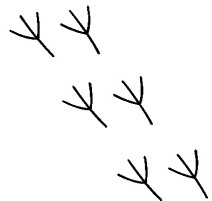

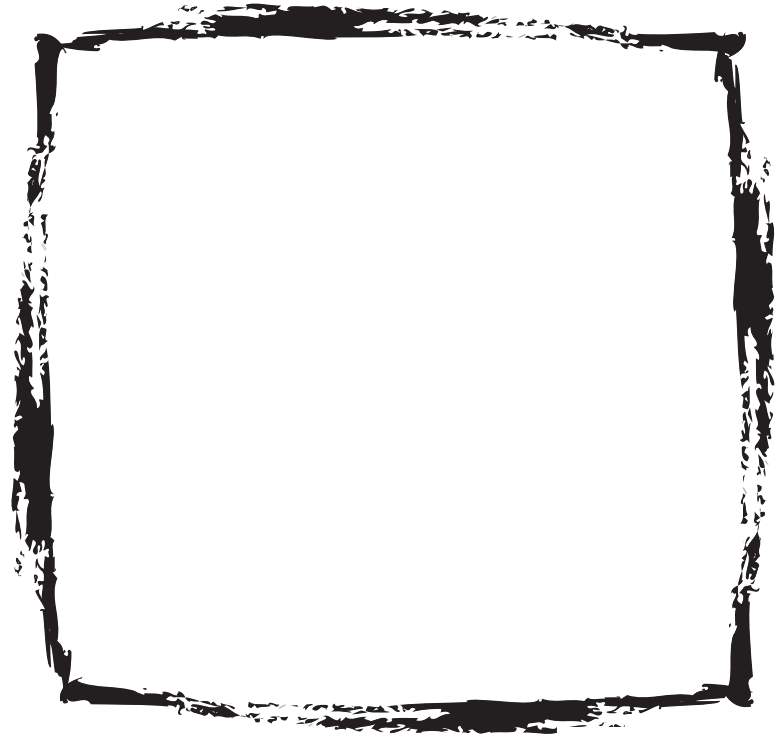


## Dover #6 School

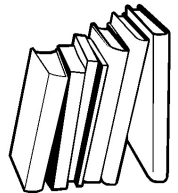

**CLUE:** Find a place where you would raise a flag in the morning.

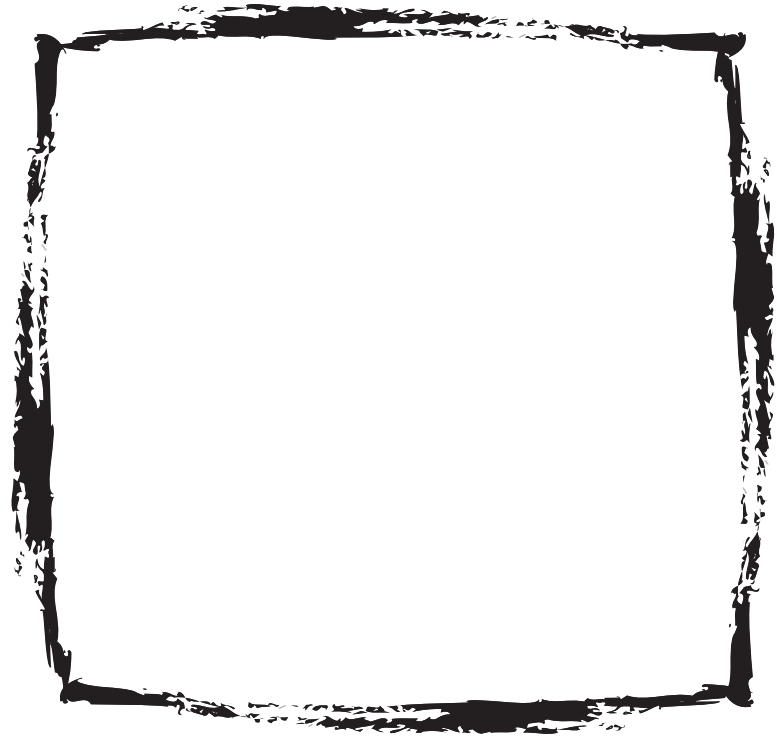


## Clermont Depot

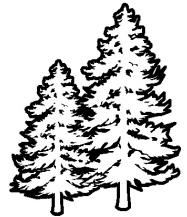
800 Larrabee Street, Clermont

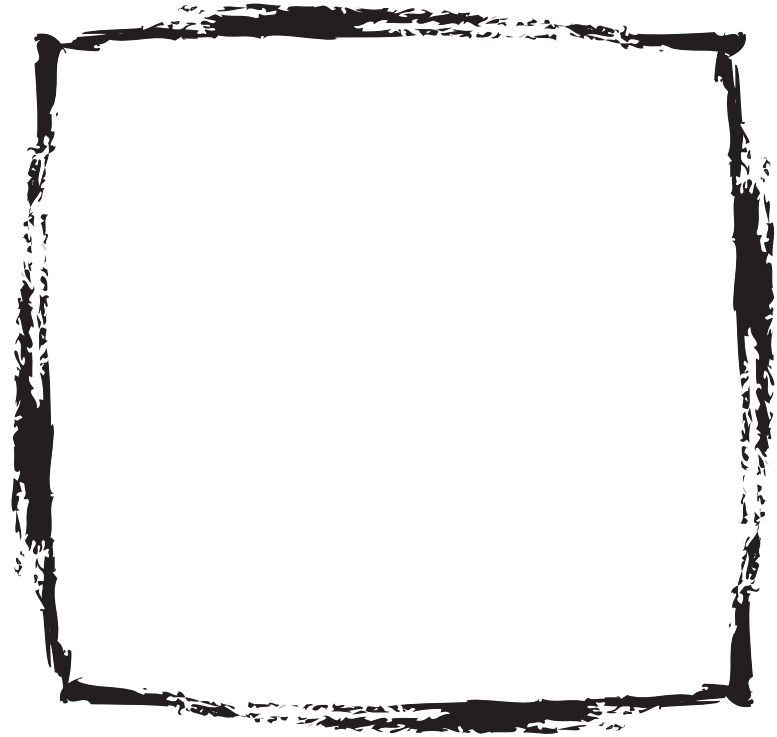


## Clermont Opera House

close to the accessible ramp.

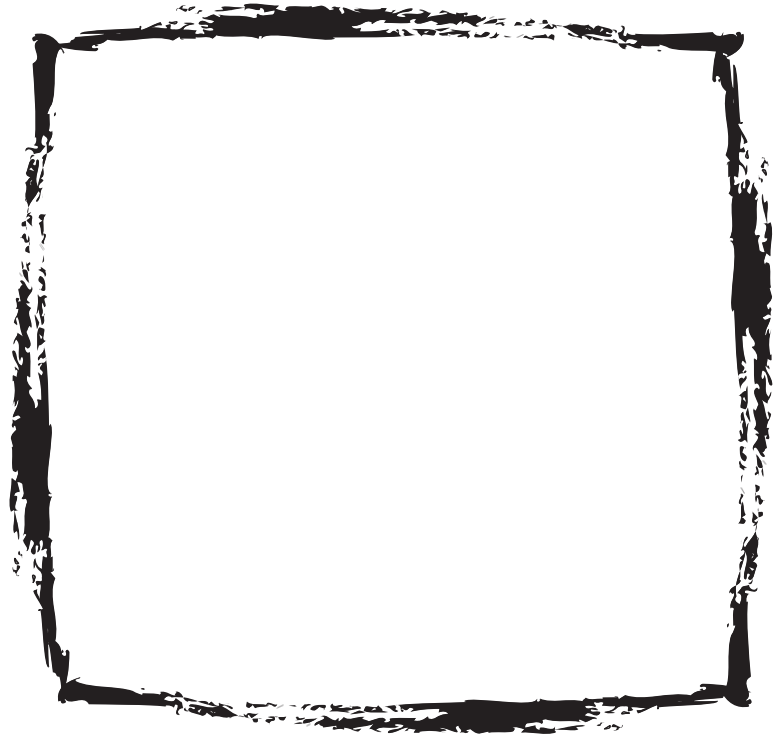


## Larrabee School

Inside, you'll find exhibits that show how children once learned their ABCs and 123s without smart boards or computers, using chalkboards, wooden desks, and simple materials. Walking through its halls provides a glimpse into the past, allowing families to connect with history. Kids will love seeing what classrooms looked like in the old days, and parents and grandparents can share stories of their own school experiences. It's a fun and educational stop on your Turkey River Safari adventure.



**CLUE:** Search in the front yard where there are usually big maps near the swings.

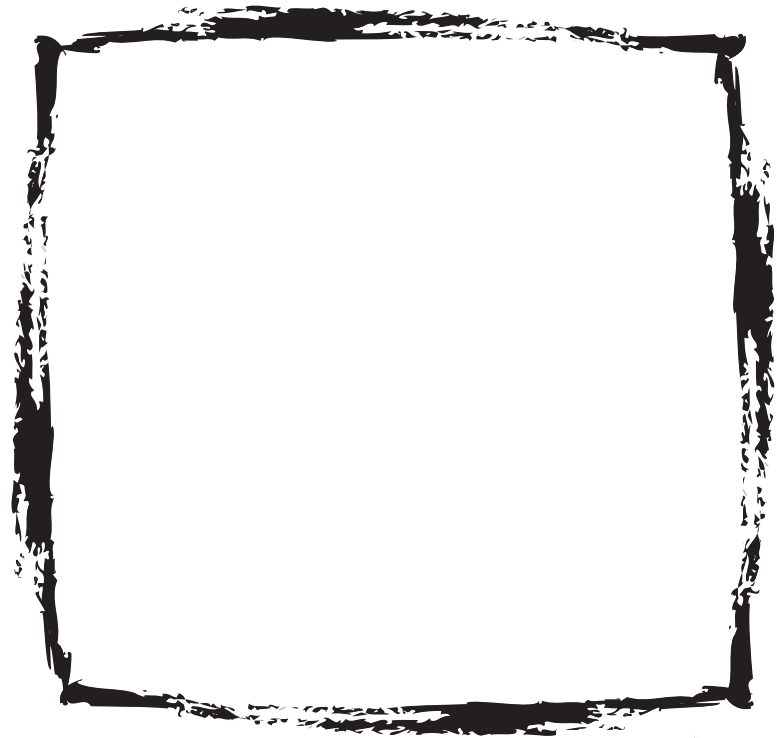


## ELGIN Sign

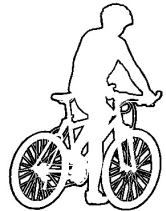
100 Center Street, Elgin

you'll see the sign!



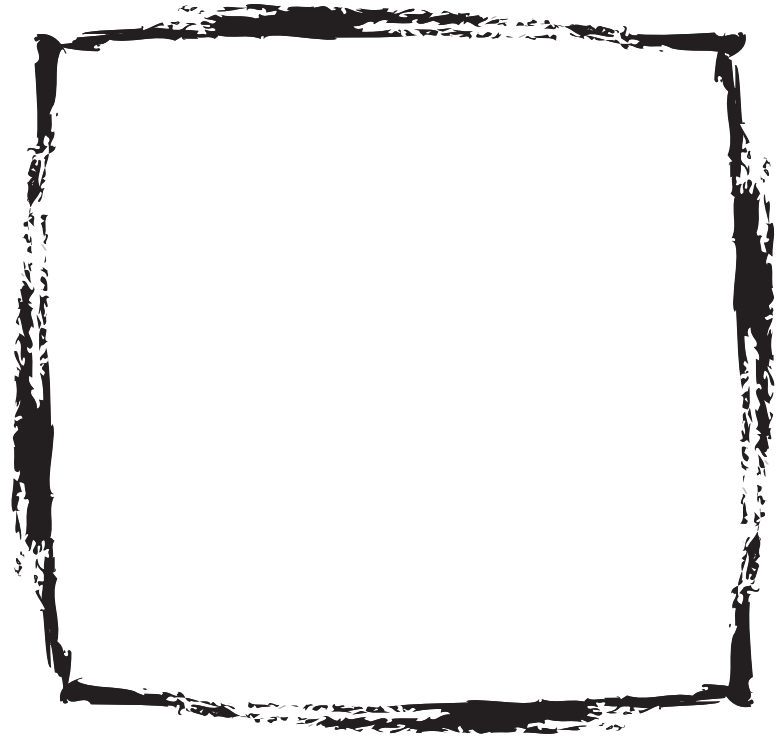
## Gilbertson Conservation Education Area

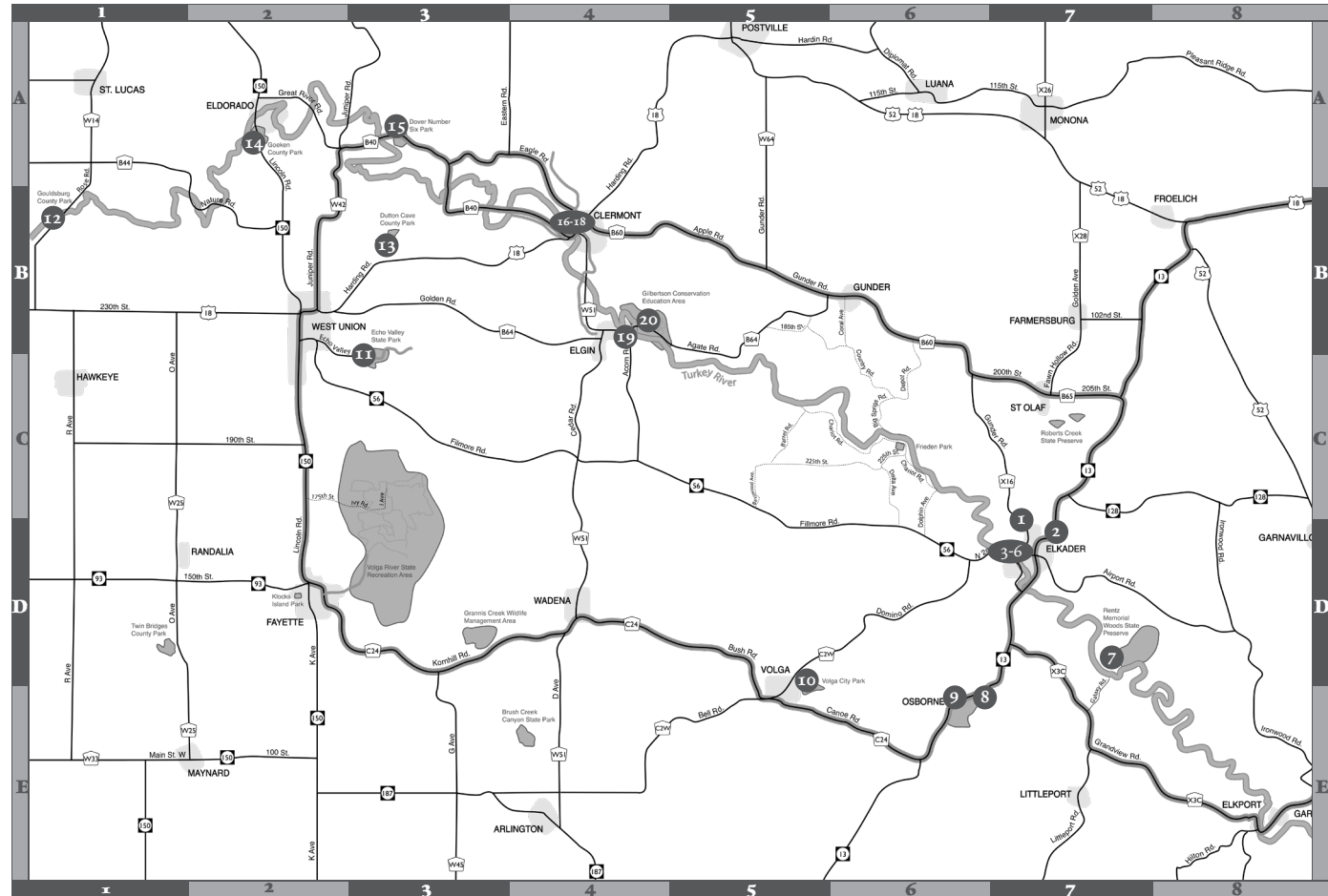
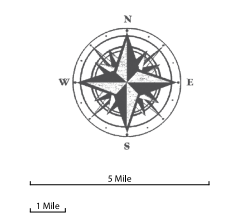
